Notes to the performer:

The pianist may adjust/release the sustain pedal slightly and selectively throughout in order to clarify harmonic texture and saturation while always maintaining the spirit of the work. In particular, measures 203 to the end, the pianist may slightly release the pedal as well as accent pitches that sound individually in order to clarify their presence in the texture but being mindful of not disrupting the sonic continuity. The pianist is also asked to adhere to the rhythm of the piece as precisely as possible but may make expressive adjustments while adhering to the spirit of the piece. Dynamics may also be attenuated for environmental acoustics, performer skill, and/or expressive purpose while again adhering to the spirit of the piece.

Each sound is an independent and democratized event that contributes to the sound field that it creates. It is an interpretation of the psychological resonance that follows a devastating personal event. The horizontal musical environment tests the limitations of how long a cycle/phrase can be extended and remain unbroken. The vertical environment tests the limits of harmonic saturation. The dance-like quality of the rhythm projects the psychological dance that is engaged in order to assist in assuaging that resonance.

This work is in part the result of a series of all-interval tetrachords presented to me by my longtime friend, colleague, and extraordinary pianist/musician Dr. Anatoly Larkin.
